Testing Your Microwave Oven

Does your microwave put out all of the power it should? here is a scientific way to test it.

"Put a cup of water in it for a couple of minutes and see if it gets hot." How often have you heard that suggestion as a method to determine efficiency of a microwave oven? For an appliance as indispensable as the microwave, there must be a better, more accurate way to measure its power. Well, there is! Here is a preferred way to determine the output wattage of your microwave, which equates to how fast it cooks.

- * Put 1 quart of water into a microwave-safe container. Measure the temperature with an accurate thermometer. It should be between 65 & 85 degrees F.
- * Cook the water for two minutes at full power.
- * After two minutes, stir the water and measure the temperature again. Subtract the starting temperature from the cooked temperature.
- * The output power is determined by multiplying the rise in the water temperature (the number from the previous step) by 20. Repeat the test three times and average the results.

for example: Start with 70-degree water. After 2 minutes the water measurers 100-degrees, a rise of 30. Multiply the 30 by 20 which shows an output power of 600 watts. But if your oven in rated at 700 watts, you've lost 100 watts, which results in longer cooking times.

If you find that the oven has lost power, you can replace it, replace the magnetron (the part that produces the cooking energy, and it isn't cheap), or modify cooking times to allow for the lower wattage. (edited from <u>Family Handyman</u>)

Ham meeting etiquette

Ham meeting-they often have a speaker at the local club or hamfest get-together. they're usually quite interesting, particularly if the subject is one that interests you.

Then how come there seem to be other QSO's going on at the same time in the same room? Often they out shout the speaker!

If you are a member of a club and your club invites a speaker then in effect you are part of that invitation. Do you invite people to your house then ignore them and hold conversations that they're not part of?

From observation it seems like hams have been developing an ability to be rude. The point is that a speaker at a function has the right to expect a listening audience. If the subject is not your thing, they you and your buddies should go out in the all or another room where you can't be hear, and enjoy each other. Other members no doubt want to hear what is said.

While on the subject of courtesy, perhaps some protocol questions should be added to the ham licensing tests. It's easy to get the feeling that some of the newer hams think that repeaters are maintained by the government or a benevolent organization for their express use. It's true many clubs, often those which a corporate sponsor who welcome and encourage all to freely participate.

Then there are those small groups who operate a repeater for their own use. Someone's call is attached to the machine. That person is responsible for what goes over the repeater. Members, or even an individual has to do the installations, do the maintenance and pay the insurance and electric bills. usually these individuals don't mind occasional use by an outsider, but when 2, 3 or more move in on a quiet machine and use it as if it were theirs, or like something they found in a parking lot,

they may very well be asked to leave.

Is it bad manners or ignorance? it is ignorance, then it is up to those teaching the courses and writing the manuals etc. to stress these things. New hams should be told to seek out a repeater club or group and join them. Ask before moving in. Simplex operation should be explained so they understand that you can actually talk to stations at some distance without a repeater. I write this there are 2 fixed stations having a long QSO about computers tying the repeater up, and I can hear both of them on a hand held on the input, an ideal situation for simplex. there's the Call Please" which turns into a QSO edging out your QSO.

From the Prez, W7YE;


I am of course biased, but I thought we had a good TARA business meeting on Tues night. I would like to see us have a bigger turnout, but there was good participation by the members who were present.

BULLETIN NR, 737 From ARRL HEADQUARTERS JAN 28, 1960

FCC has granted the request of the League that an additional fifty kilocycles be provided for phone in the twenty meter band. Effective March 10, 1960, the regulations are amended to permit phone operation from 14,200 through 14,350 kc, with no change in the classes of license required to use the band. Full details in March QST.
