W9V Goes On The Air May 9th

May-Jun 1998

Members of the Cass County Amateur Radio Club are gearing up for the 12-hour operation of W9V, the special event station commemorating the club's 45th anniversary. The dozen or so founders of the CCARC in 1953, would never have believed that today's hams would be celebrating those humble beginnings with such unheard of devices as radios without tubes, automatic antenna tuners, and complete radios you can hold in one hand which allow the operator to talk extended distances through devices known as "repeaters"! but such radios will be the main focus of the day-long operation.

At 45 years, the CCARC is one of the oldest amateur radio clubs in continuous existence in the United States. Since club members decided this was a "milestone" event, a special call sign was requested. W9V was chosen since it is a shortened version of the club station call-sign, W9VMW and would allow the club to sound distinctive while on the air.

Werner Heinrich Friederick Haak. 75, of 4216 Trees Hill Drive, died at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 21, in Home



Hospital. He had been ill for 18 months and hospitalized one week.

Born Oct. 28, 1922, in Cicero, Ill., he came to this area from Brookfield, Ill., in 1950.

He was a 1946 graduate of University of Chicago with a degree in chemistry.

His first marriage was to Dorothy L. Westphal on Aug. 31, 1946. She died in 1986. He married Vivian B. Wagoner Burkhardt on March 11. 1989, and she survives.

Mr. Haak was an Army veteran of World War II and served in the China-Burma-India theater. He was a scientific glassblower from 1950 until 1988 at Purdue University. Although he officially retired in 1988, he continued to work at Purdue until 1997.

Mr. Haak was a member of St. James Lutheran Church from 1950 until 1975, and held several offices. including Sunday school superintendent and elder. In 1975, he became a charter member of Grace Lutheran Church, again holding several offices. Until 1997, he had held a church office since he was 14 years old.

He also was a member of the China-Burma-India Veteran Association, American Orchid Society and the Lads and Lassies Square Dance Club. He was a former member of Wabash Valley Gem and Mineral Society and Tippecanoe Amateur Radio Association.

He held an advanced amateur radio license (W9NTK), was involved with lapidary, created wood crafts, collected coins and enjoyed camping and traveling.

Surviving with his wife are a son, Larry Haak of Columbus, Ind.; four daughters, Carol Haak of Chicago, Gloria Bredenhoeft of Indianapolis, Grace Gillespie of West Lafayette and Nancy Maas of Kansas City, Mo.; a stepson, Steven Burkhardt of Garland, Texas; a stepdaughter, Susan Borges of Lafayette; his mother, Hilda Haak of Bella Vista, Ark.; a brother, Eugene Haak of Arcadia. Mich.; and two sisters, Leona Baumgarten of Lee's Summit, Mo., and Ellen Scholten of Bella Vista.
