Coming from Germany I arrived in Dayton in mid April of 1964. One morning, driving around Huber Heights in preparation for my Ohio Driers License Exam and practicing the much feared backwards parking, I saw a beam antenna in my rear view mirror. I knew this was a ham antenna and I decided to come back after work to say hello.

It turned out to be Tom Nisbet, W8KRM, who invited me in and soon we had an interesting discussion going. Tom introduced me to a number of local activities and was of great help to me the newcomer to the area. Before I left, he reminded me of the upcoming Dayton Hamvention, last weekend in April. "You have to see that", he said.

Friday night of the Hamvention weekend, I drove out to Hara Arena. At that time you could pull and park a few feet away from the door. There was free coffee and doughnuts; a few dealers had set up already. Others were in the process. There was lots of space available. In those years, 60s and 70s, you could still get off the premises during the day and come back later without much delay. So, we usually went out to lunch to a nice restaurant to relax, talk and get away for an hour or so. I remember Karl, DJ8RR, who would come often during those years. He had a birthday around that time and he would get a big kick when we arranged to have the waitresses sing "Happy Birthday" for him.

The flea market was, of course, a lot smaller, giving you the feeling not to miss much, and it was not yet paved over. And, hard to believe, it never rained on Hamvention weekend. I remember though, it rained once the night

before which caused a lot of wheels to spin the next day on the soft ground. If you purchased some heavy goodies, and there was a lot more heavy stuff then, you were permitted to drive your car in and pick it up.

Reflections Gerd Schrick, WB81FM

Recently there has been a lot of talk about ham radio: where is it heading, what is its purpose. how can we attract new hams. Most of us got into ham radio at a very early age and most of us stayed with it for good; sometimes ham radio would take a back set for the benefit of family or career. But in the end it was still there. and when the kids left the house and we eventually retired there was ham radio to fall back on. the time, we got started there was not a whole lot of equipment one could buy and inevitably home brewing was a major part of the hobby. I can remember periods of many months spent on building some new transmitter or other piece and being off the air during that time. Short periods of try-out would follow, then it was back to the drawing board. For some reason our attention span was close to infinite, no deficit there. Nowadays, home brewing and the satisfaction that comes with it has taken a backseat and unfortunately a large contingent of recent hams assumes the only way to play the game is by plunking down \$\$\$, plugging in the equipment, stringing a piece of wire (there are now build-in tuners) and calling CQ. By the way, this is similar with a lot of other youth activities. Just think about all the toys that to-day's kids have with no other effort to show than just being a kid.

We may have swollen our ranks with this easy access, but those hams are different in two major aspects. Since they do not build, they do not get that feeling of satisfaction and they show very little perseverance and have low ambitions. Of course, one immediately thinks of contests. But this is another story. There is ambition involved, all right, but

it is not kind I have in mind. The new hams may memorized an awful lot about electronics, but they have a lack of understanding that come from "hands on" experience. What got most of these hams into it was the walky talky and the repeaters. Nowadays where every Dick, Tom and Harry has a cellular phone, this incentive fell by the wayside. incentive that didn't work was the dropping and watering down of the Morse code. We should stress the exclusiveness of knowing Morse, being able to communicate with a "secret" code with other hams around the world, promoting it like a foreign language. today I read in the paper that "sign language classes" have been increasing their ranks. So there you have something to get kids hooked.

The build your own station situation became clear to me when I recently got involved with a group of hams that were putting together portable microwave stations. I felt like my high school days had come back. A true feeling of achievement was felt and every extra mile bridged added to the delight. You see, in microwaves, ready built equipment is hard to come by. So you have to put together your own. results in hardly any two stations being the same. Immediately there is the pride of your own creation. Of course, there are parts available, as oscillators, mixers, filters, coax relays, dish antennas and many more items. But the market is not big enough to justify mass production as is done with the short wave and FM radios. Parts have gotten so much smaller and assembling them is more difficult but with youthful eyes and a steady hand one can do an awful lot. Going back to the basic would help: like handling and soldering components, designing and building printed circuit boards and so on. [Gerd, WB81FM]
