There is no charge for space for those wishing to set up tables inside, or for those wanting to "tailgate" outside. Setup times will be Saturday, 3:00-6:00 p.m., and Sunday 6:30-8:00 a.m. No overnight parking is allowed at the fairgrounds.

The club will have a table available for members who want to sell a few items, but do not want to set up their own tables. Members are welcome to drop off items either during the setup time on Saturday evening or Sunday morning. We'll do our best to sell your equipment.

Elmer who?

It's a wonderful thing that many new hams are entering the hobby with a background in computers, the Internet, and other technological fields. Others are finding their way into amateur radio after experiencing communications with CB or FRS. These days, it seems the first step is getting a license. But it wasn't always that way...

Traditionally, when someone became interested in finding out more about ham radio, they often sought the help of an amateur they knew or had met once. Today, it seems, a lot of folks just get their information from the Internet. While I'm certainly not knocking the valuable resources available via the computer, learning about our hobby this way leaves a lot of holes and makes it all seem a bit impersonal.

After all, this hobby is about communicating with one another. And while a great deal can be learned from the Internet and from the many good books written about the hobby, nothing can compare with the knowledge and experience shared by a good Elmer.

"Some think that the obtaining of their license was the end of a journey. We know it to be only the beginning." What's an Elmer, you say? Old timers know, as they were probably raised in the hobby by one or more of them. But most newcomers to amateur radio probably haven't even heard the term before. So, for those "newer" generation hams, just think of an Elmer as a "Yoda", in Star Wars terms!

Master Yoda had many things to teach his new young apprentice, Luke Skywalker, who was so eager to learn it all. And once the novice Luke gained just a little bit of knowledge, he thought he was ready to conquer the dark side! But Yoda had to slow down the anxious young student, show him more, make him see and feel the Force from many different perspectives. As Luke gained in knowledge and experience, Master Yoda made sure he was heading in the right directions, and doing it all for the right reasons. Yoda gave young Skywalker not only the tools to do the job, but inspired in him a sense of purpose, responsibility, and conscience.

And so it should be between new hams and their Elmers. There are many things for us to teach the new ones in our midst. Some think that the obtaining of their license was the end of a journey. We know it to be only the beginning. If we falter in sharing the years of experience and knowledge we have with the next generation of hams, then a large part of the heritage and traditions of amateur radio will be forever lost.

Sometimes the hardest part is getting the newer hams to realize they need an Elmer. It's our job, as it was Yoda's, to show them what they don't yet know, instill in them a sense of pride and responsibility, and pass on what we've always taken for granted. Most new hams don't know anything about the "unwritten rules" of amateur radio, the good operating practices they need to develop. Many need to learn about aspects of the hobby that aren't in the FCC rules or on the license exam.

I'm as guilty as anyone of griping about something I've heard new hams say on the air, or commenting about how so-and-so doesn't have any idea what they're doing. I guess if I took on more of the attitude of Yoda, I mean, an Elmer, then maybe I'd be in a better position to mentor these young apprentices and show them how to flow with the Force.

As Yoda would say, "Help teach others to become a better ham, I will. The way to do things that are right will I show them." As the ARRL might say, "Help out new hams. Be an Elmer."

For the New Hams: Some Good Operating Tips

In order to maintain and further develop this professional, yet fun and friendly hobby, we need to observe the "unwritten rules" of amateur radio. These are simply good operating practices - a list of do's and do not's. Violating them will not necessarily get you a notice from the FCC, but it might label you as a "lid", or poor operator, in amateur radio terms. You'll soon discover that more hams will want to talk with you when you observe good operating habits, and it will be easier to make new friends on the air.

These are some operating tips that we all need to follow, and especially for newer hams that may have previously been CB'ers. First of all, it's likely that most hams have at one time or another been on CB radio, and some may still use it regularly. But amateur radio is not CB, and CB jargon and operating habits need to be left on CB. Using CB lingo on the local repeater is the quickest way to let everyone know you're a "lid".

These suggestions should not be taken as criticism or seen as the pointing of fingers at any one individual. We've all been guilty of some of them at one time or another! They are simply good operating habits to help both old and new hams alike sound more experienced and professional on the air. We can all improve our on-the-air etiquette.

- The main thing to remember is to just talk normal. Talk just like you would with someone in person. There's really
 nothing different about talking over the radio. If you want to fit in, just talk normal.
- Be sure the frequency is clear before you transmit. When you first turn on the radio or tune to a different frequency, pause and listen for at least 30 seconds before transmitting.
- Don't use the word "break" to interrupt a repeater conversation unless you have an emergency. While this term may seem expedient, it is not recommended for normal use. Simply insert your callsign to gain attention.
- Don't interrupt a conversation unless you have something to add. You wouldn't walk up to two strangers talking on the street and try to change the subject, would you? Or continue to jabber on and on with someone just because you were bored and wanted something to do? Ham radio is supposed to be open and friendly, and joining in on your friends' conversations is part of the fun. But please do it with common sense, and refer to the first tip **talk normal.** Try to get along with others and be polite just as you would in person.
- Don't be guilty of over-ID'ing on repeaters. You may be very proud of your callsign, but others do not need to hear it every time you transmit. Once every ten minutes will suffice, and at the end of a contact. Besides, most of the "regulars" you talk to every day already know your callsign, don't they?
- While we're on the subject, you do not have to give the callsigns of all the other people in your conversation, or even of the one person you're talking with. They know who they are and so does everyone else when they identify. Rules for ID'ing only require that you give your callsign, not the callsign(s) of the station(s) with whom you are communicating. When you know the person you're speaking with by name, and even by the sound of their voice, follow the advice of the first tip **talk normal.** Giving the callsign of the station you're talking with, followed by your own, is okay to do at the start of a contact, and perhaps again at the end, but, please, not every time you identify.

We all have a responsibility to maintain certain standards for our hobby. Let's make sure we pass along operating practices that can keep Amateur Radio a hobby we can all be proud of. We'll have more tips in future issues.
